Ever wonder how Habitat for Humanity of the Chesapeake can work on 14 homes in up to 5 different neighborhoods across Baltimore city, Baltimore, Howard and Anne Arundel counties? It has everything to do with the number of corporate, faith, youth, and individual volunteers that contribute their time to build alongside our skilled construction crew day in and day out. With a whopping 18 partner families working their way through our affordable homeownership program, the need for these volunteers (and favorable build weather) has never been greater and fortunately, we have BOTH!

We kicked off our warm weather builds with corporate volunteers from Wells Fargo, Hord Coplan and Macht and Whiting Turner who came to the rescue installing siding and painting interiors in a nearly completed home in Milton-Montford. But the building didn't stop there! Visits from Morgan Stanley and faith volunteers from Havenwood Presbyterian Church worked diligently alongside our HabiCorps Workforce Development Trainees on drywall in Woodbourne-McCabe, putting us ahead of schedule! A few days later we welcomed volunteers from Transamerica, Marriott, Northrop, and Wolters Kluwer to Sandtown-Winchester to breathe new life into a set of rowhomes.

As you can see, at Habitat Chesapeake, it takes a village to raise a house! We work with hundreds of partners throughout the year, from the experienced construction volunteers we call Red Hats, to generous corporations who provide skilled tradespeople, to faithful church congregations who send dozens of volunteers every month. It takes many hands to build a Habitat home.

## The foundation for family and community progress

As I write, we are recognizing National Homeownership month in America – a time established to celebrate and promote the values of homeownership to our country, its cities, towns, and villages.

Part of Habitat for Humanity of the Chesapeake's

mission is to promote affordable homeownership, not simply to first-time homebuyers, neighborhoods and the entire metropolitan area, but to amplify the benefits of safe, decent, and affordable homeownership opportunities statewide. While our initiative has become more challenging financially in recent years, the values are no less significant.

Here is what we are seeing on the ground -

- For homeowners, safe, decent, and affordable homes with predictable and affordable fixed mortgage payments create a remarkable level of stability. This stability in turn creates a foundation for personal and family success in work, careers, and education.
- For **neighborhoods**, there is a remarkable ripple effect. The investment in building new or renovating older homes provokes additional revitalization efforts by community stakeholders and strengthens property markets.
- For our city and state, strong new homeowners bring new property tax revenues that outweigh the public and private costs of construction, together with closing the affordability gap.

For these reasons, and as an established affordable housing leader, we have been intentional about increasing our presence in public policy discussions on addressing the housing affordability challenges in Maryland and beyond.

Many advocates believe rental housing is the only real solution. But rental properties generate wealth for developers, not renters. Owning a home is a critical way for residents to build generational wealth, passing it along to their children and helping their communities flourish for years to come.

With over 790 homes built, more than 230 mortgages paid in full, and over 2,500 lives impacted by our work, we know for certain that affordable homeownership remains the best way for equitable wealth-building in America. Moreover, it offers great potential for community vitality right in Central Maryland. At Habitat Chesapeake, we will continue to promote and provide access to affordable homeownership and are ever grateful for your financial support, voices, and passion of our cause.

Together, we will continue to do great things. Thank you.

## BUILDING BLOCKS FOR SUCCESS

Bringing Our
First ICF House
to Baltimore County

What's as strong as concrete, but warms the heart? A Habitat Chesapeake homebuyer! Habitat Chesapeake celebrated our newest homebuyer and the completion of our very first Insulated Concrete Form (ICF) Home this past June. In partnership with the

completion of our very first Insulated Concrete Form (ICF) Home this past June. In partnership with the National Ready Mix Concrete Association's (NRMCA) "Build With Strength" coalition, BuildBlock and the ICF Manufacturers Association (ICFMA), this national initiative solidifies our efforts to make homeownership more affordable and economically sustainable right at home.

ICFs is a building technology that utilizes lightweight Styrofoam blocks insulated with poured concrete and stacked to form structures. Through the "Build With Strength" coalition, BuildBlock ICFs helped provide the materials used to build a single-family home on Elizabeth Avenue in Baltimore County, Maryland.

"BuildBlock is very excited to be a partner with the NRMCA's Build with Strength. Habitat has always been near and dear to not only the heart of our company since it started about 20 years ago, but it reinforces the values that we work for," said Brian Corder, President and CEO of BuildBlock ICFs. "We're excited when you can see the impact that building disaster-resilient and energy-efficient housing can make, especially in some of the most vulnerable communities but really for anyone."

The benefits of building with ICFs are numerous. Building with concrete is highly cost-effective, making it ideal for building affordable housing. Concrete is also a sustainable building material for its energy-efficiency, acting as an excellent insulator and lessening heating and cooling costs for homeowners.

With the help of volunteers, Habitat Chesapeake staff were able to construct the ICF home in just 8 days and sponsors from Chaney Enterprises, Vulcan Materials Company, and the Maryland Ready Mix Concrete Association (MRMCA) came together to donate materials for the effort. What began as a muddy patch in the quiet,



historic neighborhood of Halethorpe, quickly sprouted into a three-bedroom, one-bath home with a basement and driveway.

First, concrete was poured for the foundation, and then walls were constructed from expanded polystyrene (EPS) rigid insulation blocks separated by plastic webbing, reinforced with rebar, and stacked by volunteers. As the walls went up, more concrete was poured inside the blocks, providing support and structure.

#### Strong as concrete

Donnika's unassuming smile was glowing on the day of her Home Dedication. A mother of two daughters, Donnika waited a long time for her home to be complete. After entering the program in June 2020, she worked relentlessly to complete the program requirements while working full-time and navigating a pandemic. While in the program, Donnika even set a record for the most "sweat equity" hours ever completed by a partner family member, clocking

in an unbelievable 1,000 hours, far exceeding the 250 hours required by the program.

"Amazingly, Donnika has more than tripled the required sweat equity hours. She truly embraces what the Habitat partnership is all about," said Steve Bolton, Habitat Chesapeake Chief Operations Officer, as he presented Donnika with a special recognition award.

Today, with keys in hand, Donnika is looking forward to helping her daughters decorate their own rooms. "Habitat for Humanity is a dream come true and I am thankful every day that I am being given the opportunity of owning my first home," said Donnika. "I can ask for nothing more at this time but continuing to be successful in my journey. I am happy to be in a great place in my life and will continue to help others."

As Donnika triumphantly cut the ribbon on her new home, she also made history as the first Habitat Chesapeake homeowner to own an ICF home. Through this partnership, Habitat Chesapeake hopes to bring even more ICF homes to Baltimore – starting in Northwest Baltimore's Pen Lucy neighborhood, broadening opportunities for more families to put down roots and build a legacy as strong as concrete.

# North Baltimore Presbyterians Put Faith Into Action in Woodbourne-McCabe

The North Baltimore Presbyterians (NBP) are back at it again! Early this summer, Habitat Chesapeake hosted a series of build days with our long-time faith partners, who are generously sponsoring their 4th Habitat home in Woodbourne-McCabe. This time they put faith into action while working alongside our HabiCorps Trainees!

NBP are no strangers to Habitat's work in this closeknit community. It comes at no surprise that a handful of volunteers could even recite a list of projects dating back several years, illustrating their commitment to Habitat's mission of building affordable homes across the Chesapeake.

"We've worked in a ton of communities," said one volunteer. "We've done painting, built cabinets at Orchard Ridge, and even helped break up concrete in a basement with a jackhammer."

While spending time reflecting on their service, Rick, a now retired engineer, long-time volunteer, and member of Havenwood Presbyterian Church noted, "My older son was 16 years old when he first hung drywall in Pigtown. He's now 37," he recounted, "Even though my son has since grown up and moved away, I continue to come back with Havenwood to rehab homes...It just makes you feel good."

This summer also provided the perfect opportunity for NBP volunteers to get some hands-on instruction from our HabiCorps Trainees. With the completion of their 10.5 month of training drawing near, the cohort of trainees have engrained themselves into the workings of building Habitat homes. So much so that they were able to lead NBP volunteers in hanging drywall, ultimately putting the home ahead in its construction schedule!

change the world." This is the undeniable feeling that resonates every May, when Habitat Chesapeake welcomes women volunteers and their supporters to build sites in support of Women Build. Since 1991, Habitat for Humanity has hosted women-focused builds to empower women and their families and take a proactive step in supporting their communities. At Habitat Chesapeake, this yearly tradition invites women to roll up their sleeves and get involved right here in central Maryland.

According to Habitat for Humanity International, 8 out of 10 Habitat homeowners are also mothers. Historically, women have faced various barriers and inequalities in accessing homeownership, making it more challenging for women to become homeowners and establish long-term financial security.

That's where Women Build volunteers come in. From installing siding to painting walls and ceilings, this year's volunteers gifted their time, energy, and funds to support

the rehabilitation of several homes in Milton-Montford. This East Baltimore community suffered from a period of disinvestment but now boasts convenient access to Johns Hopkins Hospital, an influx of local institutions, and a beautiful public park. With 8 homes already completed in the area and 5 actively under construction, Habitat Chesapeake is looking forward to expanding the number of affordable homeownership opportunities to women and their families through the support of Women Build partners.

"Habitat has given me the opportunity to live out my dream of owning a home and leaving behind a legacy for my children," said Whitney, a recent Habitat homebuyer. Like many Habitat Chesapeake homebuyers, Whitney is a working single mother with children, who felt that her student

loans would prevent her from homeownership. With Habitat's affordable, zero-interest mortgage capped at thirtypercent of her total income, the dream of homeownership is now a reality for Whitney.

For other volunteers, Habitat offers opportunities to learn skills in renovation and home repair while helping to build homes for deserving families. "It's a great feeling, and it's great to get out from behind my desk to do something good," said Joanne, a Wells Fargo employee.

This year, Wells Fargo volunteers were onsite for two days in May, dividing their time between installing trim on Rose Street and painting interiors on Eager Street. Wells Fargo has been an enthusiastic partner with Habitat Chesapeake for over 15 years and has given over \$750,000 to date. As a 360-degree partner, their support has been on full display through participation and sponsorships of Habitat Chesapeake's annual specialty builds including Women Build, Pride Build, MLK Day of Service and Summer Build Blitz.
